In-Coming Commodore's Signal.





Tales of War and (Cod) Peace



Being a relative new comer to Yorkshire and the boating scene, it never ceases to amaze me that our local area has seen some pretty heavy action over the years. Not least in the Cod Wars of 1976.

The *Arctic Corsair* pictured above is the last surviving member of the once thriving fishing fleet based in Hull and is a Sidewinder Trawler. She fished mainly for Cod and Haddock during her "Deep Sea" days and often spent up to 24 days at sea. Built locally in Beverley and launched in 1960 by Cook, Welton and Gemmell she is a record breaker. In 1973 she landed the world record largest catch of Cod and Haddock from the White Sea.

The extension of Iceland's fishing limits to 200 miles in 1975 saw *Arctic Corsair* involved in the cod wars, during which she was rammed by an Icelandic gun boat. Hull's fleet of over 150 sidewinders was hard hit by the loss of traditional fishing grounds and the fuel price increases of the early 1970's. A few of the more modern and efficient Stern Trawlers continued to fish out of Hull during the final years of the decline in Hull's deep sea fishing industry.



Simple Thai Noodle Soup



Ingredients

- 1 good knob fresh root ginger peeled and roughly chopped
- I-2'red chillies, seeds removed (optional), roughly chopped
- 1-2 stalks lemongrass, tough outer layers removed, roughly chopped
- 2-3 garlic cloves, peeled
- 1 handful fresh coriander, a few sprigs reserved and chopped
- a glug or two vegetable oil
- Coriander seeds
- 1-2 pinches ground turmeric
- small jug vegetable stock
- a couple of handfuls rice noodles
- 1 x 400ml/14fl oz can coconut milk
- 1 large handful raw, peeled tiger prawns (the shells and heads can be reserved for making stock in another recipe)
- a few splashes Thai fish sauce, to taste

Preparation method

- Finely chop the ginger, chilli, lemongrass, garlic and coriander adding a little vegetable oil if the resulting paste is too dry.
- Add the paste you have made to a large shallow pan and cook for a few minutes to release the aromas, stirring frequently.
- Roughly crush some coriander seeds with a pestle and mortar and add to the paste with a pinch or two of turmeric and the vegetable stock and simmer for a few minutes.
- Meanwhile, pour some boiling water over the rice noodles in a bowl and let them sit until they have softened, about 4-5 minutes, then drain and set aside.
- To soften the heat of the sauce, add the coconut milk to the pan and bring back to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for a few minutes while you de-vein the prawns by cutting along the back of the prawn with a small sharp knife and removing the black 'thread' using the point of the knife. (or buy some ready prepared ones...) Add the prawns to the pan and cook for 2-3 minutes, or until pink and tender, finishing off with splashes of Thai fish sauce, to taste, and more chopped fresh coriander, to your taste.
- To serve, divide the drained noodles between two bowls and ladle over the aromatic soup with the prawns and serve straightaway. Chicken, scallops or mushrooms are a great alternative to the prawns.
- This would be great with some proper crusty bread and a glass of chilled white wine.
